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his thoughts on his approach to his work. Ion Branston: Was there anything in particular you wanted to convey or emphasize when you put together the tour?

David Rose: In the several years I've spent working closely with more recent BMW design, one of the things that I always want to showcase with the vintage cars is the pure craftsmanship of the design, and the design exploration that occurred, particularly between the touring cars, roadster, and more mainstream vehicles. The BMW "design language" wasn't nearly as consistent as we think of it today—that didn't hit until the 1960s—and the overlap in styles before and after World War II is always interesting.

My goal with this tour was to showcase how the design evolved to reflect the wants and needs of the era, combining archival footage, audio cues, and of course, visuals of the incredibly beautiful and complex automotive designs that spanned BMWs first forty-five years.
